1. Please indicate the name and location of the fire station(s) that serve the project area. Also, indicate, the equipment, personnel and emergency medical services available at each station.

Primary - Station 1: 714 Pier View Way: One fire engine, One ambulance, 5 total personnel

Secondary – these stations will respond as a backup or in support of Station 1 when they are on an assignment already. Station 1 is in the very high category of utilization as identified in a third-party consultant study, and the following stations are further away resulting in extended response times.

Station 2: 1740 Ditmar St: One fire engine, One ambulance, 5 total personnel

Station 7: 3350 Mission Avenue: One Battalion Chief, One fire engine, One Ladder Truck, One Ambulance, 10 total personnel

2. What is the approximate response time to the project site from each station?

The Oceanside Fire Department does not use average response time as a standard. Oceanside City Council policy 05-R0702-1 established a response time standard for the Fire Department of arriving on scene five minutes or less, 90 percent of the time. This response time starts when the emergency call is received at the Fire Department Dispatch Center and ends when the first unit arrives at the scene. The dataset used for this analysis is from the Oceanside Fire Department Records Management System (RMS) for Calendar Year 2022. An analysis was performed on the project site for emergency responses to the reported address locations of 195 S. Tremont, 235 S. Tremont, and 313 S. Cleveland. There were 176 responses to these address locations in calendar year 2022. The first arriving unit arrived to the project site in five minutes or less on 58% of responses. The 90th Percentile Response Time for emergency responses to the project site was 7 minutes and 17 seconds.

3. Are there any current plans for expansion of OFD facilities, services, or staff or to construct a new facility that would serve the City of Oceanside?

Yes. The construction of new Fire Station 1 is currently in process that will be located at 410 Freeman St, Oceanside 92054. Construction of a new Fire Station 1 will allow for the potential staffing of a fire engine, truck company, one ambulance, one Battalion Chief and an EMS Squad in the downtown area. However, there is no funding currently available for the purchase of a new aerial truck apparatus or the staffing needed for the truck or EMS Squad.

4. Would the proposed project substantially increase response times or create a substantial increase in demand for OFD staff, facilities, equipment, etc.?

The proposed project will increase both response times and increase the demand for Oceanside Fire staff, facilities and equipment. Currently the site consists of small commercial buildings which does not have 24-hour occupancy. However, that will change as the proposed project includes residential dwellings, mixed use and commercial which will increase call volume and department resources. Currently the project is proposed as 5 buildings; one parking structure (5 stories), one office building (4 stories), one hotel (6 stories) and two mixed use buildings (Both 5 stories). Total square footage of the proposed development is approximately 1,527,821 vs approximately 10,000 currently.

5. Please indicate any development impact fees required for new developments.

Two of the five buildings of the proposed development will be required to annex in the Citywide Public Safety Community District (CFD) as it will exceed 16 dwelling units. Annexation into the Citywide Public Safety CFD shall occur prior to occupancy of the first dwelling unit. Additional impact fees are assigned as identified in the City's fee and permit structure.

6. Do you anticipate that required fees and taxes provided by new developments associated with the proposed project will adequately mitigate the expected increase in fire and emergency medical service demand?

Due to the scope of the project, with only two of the buildings contributing to the CFD, the fees and taxes will not adequately mitigate the expected increase in fire and emergency medical demand.

7. Do you anticipate that implementation of the proposed project would result in the need for physical additions to your agency (i.e., construction of new fire stations)?

Yes, we anticipate the need for physical additions to the department in terms of equipment. The addition of this significant project in the downtown area will adversely impact the ongoing Oceanside Fire Department (OFD) services in the downtown area.

8. Do you have any required or recommended mitigation measures for significant impacts?

As this development will provide significant impacts, our recommended mitigation measures would include to purchase a Type I fire engine, refurbish and relocate our existing ladder truck to our fire station 1 and to purchase a medic squad vehicle with equipment.

2. What is the geographical area and total population which is served by the station?

The city of Oceanside is approximately 42 square and has a population of approximately 174,000

3. How many law enforcement officers and patrol cars presently serve the project area vicinity? Does your agency have an established target staffing level (i.e. personnel/population)?

OPD has 10 patrol beats of which 3 are located in Sector 1 which provides coverage for the Transit Center. These are one-person units and are staffed 24/7 - 365

We also have "Downtown" team that is staffed from 4am to midnight with 6 officers.

4. What is the City's target response time? Is the City currently meeting these times? What is the approximate response time to the project site?

Priority 1 (serious calls) have target response time of less than five minutes. We are currently meeting these times.

Based on the amount of officers normally working in this area, I would expect the response time for Priority 1 calls to be less than 5 minutes.

5. Are there any plans for facility expansion or new facilities, please provide as much detail as possible? Where does your agency acquire funding for new facilities?

We have identified a site for a new police headquarters near the intersection of Mesa Drive and Rancho Del Oro however it is in the early planning stages and funding has not yet been secured.

6. Please indicate any development impact fees required for new developments.

This is not a Police function so I would encourage a discussion with the city's Planning Department.

7. Do you anticipate any significant impacts associated with the proposed project on current service within the City, such as increasing service calls, increasing response times, or the need for additional personnel or patrol cars? Please provide generation factors if it is determined that additional personnel or patrol cars are required.

With addition of 547 residential apartment units, 165 hotel rooms, and new retail space there will surely be an increase in calls for service to this area however response times should remain largely similar to present numbers.

8. Do you have any required or recommended mitigation measures for significant impacts?

To mitigate significant impacts, it is strongly recommended that the developer participate in the CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) process with our department. It's for this reason that we (OPD) have requested a "seat at the table" as the project continues.

At one point there was discussion that this facility would have a "community space" that Parks and Recreation would have access to or would be able to program/make available as rental space. If possible, this would still be of benefit.

 - b. *Adequacy currently can be evaluated in part by the City's Community Facilities Element standards:*
 - i. *Facilities standards are not currently evaluated site-by-site. Current standard: "Library Facilities floor area of 0.55 square feet per resident of the City of Oceanside." The standard gives a present target of 97,075 square feet citywide. There are currently approximately 53,400 square feet of Library Facilities, or 55%*

of standard, including the Civic Center and other two Libraries (and their Community Rooms) outside the project; Oceanside READS, and the interiors of the two Mobile Libraries, which also serve neighborhoods outside the project area.

- ii. *Numbers of volumes, DVDs and other items are not currently tracked in regular reports by facility location. Current standard: "A ratio of total items in the Oceanside library inventory of 3.0 items per resident of Oceanside." The current total collection of 171,896 items provides a ratio of 0.97 items per resident citywide, or 33% of standard.*
 - iii. *Numbers of employees and volunteers are not currently measured according to standard at a location. Current standard: "A ratio of three (3) public library staff, consisting of one librarian plus two clerical staff, per 6,000 residents of the City of Oceanside." The Library's current total staffing of approximately 53 individuals, including part-time hourly extra help and some staff only supported for current grants, meets approximately 62% of this standard citywide.*
- c. *Further understanding of the present definition of adequacy can be derived from the capital improvement plans mentioned in the Community Facilities Element:*
- i. *"2.3 The City of Oceanside shall undertake a systematic capital improvements program for the construction of new and expanded library facilities in order to supplement and complement facilities and services provided at the Main Library within the Civic Center in the Downtown Area. This program shall include:*
 - *[Construction of library facilities in the eastern San Luis Rey Valley and Tri-City areas, outside the project area.]*
 - *Designation of the Downtown Library as the Main Library facility.*
- This facilities construction program shall be targeted for completion by Fiscal Year 1994-95. The feasibility of completion by this target date depends on the future community growth and the availability of financing sources."*
- ii. *"2.5 Future libraries should be conveniently accessible to pedestrians, automobiles, and public transit. Locations where large numbers of potential users gather should be considered desirable sites. If possible, these facilities should be combined with other public facilities, parks, shopping centers, or other activity centers in order to encourage the community facilities campus concept."*
- "2.6 Library programs should be available to all members of the community and should include services for those who cannot conveniently access a library."*

2. What services/programs does the library system currently offer?

- a. *The Library offers robust programming for all ages in Oceanside, such as storytimes, book clubs, art classes and reading challenges. It offers adult and family literacy support, bookmobiles, concerts, author events, kindergarten readiness workshops, homework help, and many other services. Personalized reading recommendations, volunteer opportunities, teen internships, and inspiring art exhibits are provided by the Library. Offerings to check out include books, e-books, e-audio, e-resources; and newer nontraditional items, including California State Park Passes for day use, toys for ages zero to five, a Seed Library, Check Out Nature Backpacks; and ukuleles (as an extension of cultural activities). The Library also manages the City's arts and cultural work, through the City's Arts Commission and state-designated Oceanside CA Cultural District.*

b. *Library services that provide items and content to borrow, in parallel or as substitutes for facilities, include:*

i. *Library Home Delivery service, dispatched from Civic Center Library to any requesting residents in boundaries of City of Oceanside*

1-2 staff preparing / making deliveries on any weekday

ii. *Digital Library services available to Oceanside resident mailing addresses*

accessed at www.oceansidepubliclibrary.org under "Browse"

approximately 3-7 staff working on service at any time

iii. *LINK+ free borrowing/lending service through Oceanside Public Library from various libraries throughout California. Items can be ordered online, picked up from Civic Center Library or received via Home Delivery.*

1-2 staff working on service at any time

3. Are there any planned additions to existing library resources or facilities?

The Library is undergoing a Library Study, which will produce a Facilities Plan, Service Assessment and its next 4-year Strategic Plan. This work has commenced and will be completed approximately at the end of calendar year 2023. It will create a document, the Facilities Plan, that will most likely take the place of the current City's Community Facilities Element. We intend to expand the mini-Library program to other City facilities, and may embrace other expansion strategies following the Library Study work.

4. How are library service needs/standards determined (i.e. volumes/ population)?

See references to standards in response to question 1. The City's Community Facilities Element mentions,

"OBJECTIVE: To provide and maintain adequate public library facilities, staffing, inventory of items and volumes, and related services for all residents of the City of Oceanside, within the State of California published guidelines of California Libraries in the 1980's: Strategies for Service as feasible."

"2.1 The City of Oceanside, through the Oceanside Public Library Board of Trustees, shall make reasonable efforts to provide and maintain...library facilities and service standards within the City."

As noted, these measures are currently not reached with existing facilities, staffing and numbers of items. The standards may be reviewed through the Library Study process mentioned in response to question 3.

5. What are the current sources of revenue or funds for the library? Are new developments assessed fees, and if so, what are the amounts?

The Library is funded by the City's General Fund, in FY 22-23 with approximately \$6.2 million. Programming is generously supported by the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library and the Oceanside Public Library Foundation. New developments are not assessed fees specifically for Library services. There is also no prescriptive measure for arts elements in developments, but those additions are highly encouraged. The Arts Commission and Oceanside CA Cultural District

have been in conversation with the development team, and look to continue that goal and offer support in its process.

6. Do you anticipate any significant impacts from the project on current services and capacities at the library? If so please describe how this determination came to be in as much detail as possible.

As with the other recent developments in the downtown area, the usage of the Library most likely will increase. The Civic Center Library sees around 18,000 visits monthly. Its Community Room is also in use, and we would expect to see an increase in its usage as well. The other 3 facilities and 3 related services provided in the project area, listed under questions 1 and 2, have varying numbers of visits or uses. We do not currently have resources that enable us to make specific determinations of project impacts on Library services and capacities. Some of this may be developed through or as a result of the Library Study.

7. Do you anticipate that project implementation would result in the need for physical additions to the library?

As noted under Question 1, the Civic Center Library is within ten blocks, or 0.5 miles, of the NCTD project. The impact on that facility and its services could be evident following the building of the hotel, apartments and retail.

Likewise, if community outreach regarding adult and family literacy and English as a Second Language services proves successful, it is possible there could be impact on the Library's Oceanside READS Learning Center. The Mobile Library facility and Home Delivery service in the area, both involving vehicles, could also see increased demand. All of these could result in the need for physical additions – to the City-owned structure of Civic Center Library, to the amount of current space leased for the Learning Center, and for the upkeep, replacement or expansion of the Mobile and Delivery vehicle operations.

Pending work such as the completion of the Library Study, we do not have detailed analysis on needs for physical additions such as these that could result from the project.
